
Frédéric Joos


Extract

Colours help us indicate, define and discriminate. They show us what we need to see, what we must recognize. Colour is what first springs to mind about anything or anyone: President Obama is black, the sky is grey, this car is yellow, men prefer blondes, and Go Blues!

Even our most inner feelings sometimes take on eloquent shades: I sometimes feel **blue**, **green** with envy, or tickled **pink**... Colour is present in the Greek, Latin or Arabic etymology of many words. There is **yellow** in

crocodile (from the Greek krokos meaning "yellowish", and delios meaning "skin"), and gold in chrysanthemum (from the Greek krysos meaning "gold", and anthe meaning "flower"), there is blue in cyanide (from the Greek kuanos meaning "blue"), purple in iodine vapour (from the Greek ion meaning "purple"), and white in every candidate (from the latin candor meaning "bright white", because people who applied for civil service in Ancient Rome wore white togas).

Renaming – All about words' deepest secrets

Don't you get the feeling some words are constantly repeated, words such as: "school", "organic", "unemployment", "recession", "economy", "media" and "pollution". Yet do we really know what they mean? Sophie Chérer's book reveals their family secrets, giving back to each and every one its - often unexpected original meaning.

Ever wanted to know why Freud named his famous complex after "Oedipus", why we call raw slices of beef "carpaccio" and a certain means of coercion is "boycott"? Find out why those names came to be commonly used words. Where do the words we use on a day-to-day basis come from? How did they come about? Why did we choose them specifically and not others?

This book will make you see the world in a whole new way.



Sophie Chérer

has a personal tradition: she jots down every new word she learns in a small notepad. She started with the word "Balalaika", a Russian music instrument she found out about six years ago. This book is not quite a collection of short stories, yet not an actual dictionary. She simply wanted to share her love for the French language, as well as her indignation at its misuses. "In late 2014, I traveled to Cambodia to help out in a French NGO called Sipar. Sipar promotes reading and fights against illiteracy in Cambodia. Sothik, the Cambodian manager, came to greet me at Phnom Penh airport. As we drove to the city, Sothik said a few enigmatic words about his childhood. His exact phrasing was: "I have a lot to say but no time to do so". He was referring to the civil war that devastated Cambodia between 1975 and 1979 and crushed his childhood. At the end of my stay, having seen Sipar's building libraries within schools, factories, prisons, and promoting reading by publishing books, I asked Sothik if he would tell me his story which, I believed, would make an interesting read for children in France, Cambodia and elsewhere. Without a moment's hesitation, Sothik began: "I was eight..." His memories had been waiting to be told for years."

Marie Desplechin



Tian is the youngest on the team. He is French and Cambodian. He was born in 1975, only a few years after the rise of the dictatorship that forced his family to flee Cambodia. He was five when he arrived in France. Tian grew up in the Lyon region, and is now an illustrator. He wrote a comic book about his life during the war (The Year of the Hare). He frequently travels back to Cambodia which remains his second home.




Tian and fellow countryman **Sothik** are good friends. Sothik runs Sipar, a company that promotes reading in Cambodia. Sipar is also the name of the French NGO that supports Sothik's work. Sothik was born in 1967 in a small village near the city of Kompong Cham. He spent his entire childhood under the Khmer Rouge's cruel dictatorship. He only started school once the war was over. He studied literature and pedagogy in Russia, and spent some time in Caen (Normandy) studying education and pedagogy. His book is about

what we all share.



Marie Depleschin,

the eldest in the gang (born in 1959), is a writer – mostly for children. She travelled to Cambodia for the first time in 2014. Prompted by Suzanne Sevray – long-standing head of *l'école des loisirs*' foreign rights department – to join Sipar, Marie witnessed the work they did in Cambodia and met Sothik. At the end of her three-week stay, she and Sothik decided to work together on this book, and they asked Tian to illustrate it.





Sothik

Sothik was born in 1967 in Cambodia. Young Sothik was only three years old when the civil war broke out – eight when the Khmer Rouge took power. Everything changed overnight: money was abolished, books were destroyed, religion was prohibited and private property was banished.

Sothik and his family had to leave their home and abandon their belongings, and were forced to show total obedience to the new

regime. But that wasn't enough... The Khmer Rouge began taking children away from their parents. That is how, after joining a group of children his age, Sothik was left to face terror and famine.

has kept a diary since she was seven, writing a few words in it every morning. Not much, merely a few thoughts about what happened the previous day, "the raw reality", as she puts it. That's the reason why she decided to write about a pink notebook filled with secrets. And here's another secret: It took Susie twenty years to write this novel...





SOLD German Italian, Korean "I live in Dijon. Whenever I go to Paris, usually for a meeting with l'école des loisirs, I arrive at Gare de Lyon and walk to rue de Sèvres. It's an hour-long stroll that takes me through rue du Faubourg Saint-Antoine. That winter – back in 2014 – a Romani family had taken refuge under the canopy of a shop that had been closed for months. A dad, a mum, a young woman holding a baby in her arms, and children of all ages lying on pieces of cardboard, hardly protected from the cold and rain. They weren't asking for anything. Passers-by looked the other way and made sure to walk far from them. For it's a well-known fact of course: poverty is contagious.

I was one of those passers-by. And that family's presence did bother me: it made me feel irritated, powerless and sort of guilty. What were they doing there? What had they suffered "back home" to make them want to come here? Was it acceptable to let kids live that way?

That was the starting point of *The Ursari's* Son.

The other starting point was in Bangladesh, in 2008 when Nura Muhammad, a political opponent, decided to flee for fear of retaliation with his eight-year-old son Fahim. Illegal immigrants, father and son settled in Creteil, a city on the eastern outskirts of Paris. The young Fahim began playing chess and soon the Créteil Chess club realized he was an exceptional player and should join the Junior national team... which appeared impossible as he was a homeless kid with an "illegal" Dad.

Thanks to the support from Fahim's "master of chess", the boy and his father were granted a resident permit from the Prime Minister

The family of a bear-keeper, an "Ursari" as the Romani say, never settles for long in the same place. Harassed by the police, chased away by locals, Ciprian and his family decide to let go of their bear and flee to Paris where, rumor has it, work and money are easy to find.

Once they settle in a shantytown on the outskirts of Paris, all the members of the family find a job: Daddy, the ursari, becomes a scrap merchant, Mum and Vera become professional beggars, and Dimetriu, the eldest brother, works as a wallet "borrower", wih Ciprian as his assistant. One evening, Ciprian comes home from his "day's work" empty-handed. He's discovered the Luxembourg Gardens where he spent all day spying on chess players. Although the young boy knows nothing about chess, he is able to replay an entire game in his head. And that strikes the beginning of a new life for the Ursari's son...



Xavier-Laurent Petit is like a


parabolic antenna: he's got great quality and long-distance reception. That's what enabled him to pinpoint the subjects of his novels, such as the Algerian Civil War (The Oasis), a street children's band in Bolivia (Maestro!), or white tiger poaching in Russia (Wild World). The startingpoints of the Ursari's Son were the true story of Fahim Mohammad, a young illegal immigrant who turned out to be a chess genius, and the photo of an Eastern European bear-keeper.
